


Headteacher's Update



Faith - πίστη

Nativity of Our Most Holy Lady Theotokos and Ever Virgin Mary- commemorated on 8 September.



The Nativity of Our Most Holy Virgin Mary is celebrated by the Church as a day of universal joy. Within the context of the Old and the New Testaments, the Most Blessed Virgin Mary was born on this day, having been chosen before the ages by Divine Providence to bring about the Mystery of the Incarnation of the Word of God. She is revealed as the Mother of the Saviour of the World. Our Lord Jesus Christ.

She was born in the city of Galilee, Nazareth. Her parents were Joachim of the tribe of the Prophet-King David, and Anna from the tribe of the First Priest Aaron. The couple was without child and having reached old age, Joachim and Anna had strong faith that everything was possible with God. Joachim and Anna vowed to dedicate the child which the Lord might give them to the service of God in the Temple. Childlessness was considered as a Divine punishment for sin, and Joachim and Anna had to endure abuse from their own countrymen. On one of the feast days at the Temple, the elderly Joachim brought his sacrifice to offer to God, but the High Priest would not accept it, considering him to be unworthy since he was childless.

In deep grief, Joachim went into the wilderness, and there he prayed with tears to the Lord for a child. Anna wept bitterly when she learned what had happened at the Temple. Never once did she complain against the Lord, but rather she prayed to ask God's mercy on her family. The Lord answered their prayers when the pious couple had attained extreme

old age and prepared themselves for a sublime calling to be the parents of the Most Holy Virgin Mary, the future Mother of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The Archangel Gabriel brought Joachim and Anna the joyous message that their prayers were heard by God, and of them would be born a most blessed daughter, Mary, through whom would come the Salvation of all the World. The Most Holy Virgin Mary surpassed in purity and virtue not only all mankind, but also the angels. She was manifest as the living Temple of God, so the Church sings in its festal hymns: "the East Gate... bringing Christ into the world for the salvation of our souls."

The Nativity of the Theotokos marks the change when the great promises of God for salvation from slavery to the devil/evil were about to be fulfilled. This event brought to earth the grace of the Kingdom of God, a Kingdom of Truth, piety, virtue and everlasting life. The Theotokos is revealed to all of us by grace as a merciful Intercessor and Mother, to Whom we all have access with great devotion.


- A talk from Admissions Tutors about interviews;



Title: I am Thunder; And I Won't Keep Quiet

Author: Muhammad Khan

Genre: Young adult fiction

A brief synopsis:

'I Am Thunder' is an award-winning novel and a story for our time. A simple Google informs that this book is aimed at YA aged 12+ although I found some of the language more appropriate for Key Stage 4 students. The author, who is also a Maths teacher in London, has used his experience with young people to capture brilliantly how young people talk to each other and this makes the novel an easy and engaging read.

The subject matter is not easy however, as the plot deals with terrorism and grooming. The author handles these wonderfully well. He also sensitively handles friendships, growing up and family problems equally deftly. The main protagonist, Muzna, is growing up a single, Muslim child in a Pakistani family and her story takes the reader through the multitude of the problems she faces from Year 9 to the end of Year 11. The relationships she has with her friends, boyfriend, and her family and with herself are captivating.

Although I think some of the behaviour and comments in the classroom sections of the book may be exaggerated (I am not sure the author would tolerate some of the comments made by characters in his classroom!), an authentic depiction of a young person's struggles has been created. These struggles are real and there is no exaggeration necessary for them to be shocking. All who read it will have a wider awareness of topical and worrying concerns for young adults.

Recommendations (Would you recommend this book? Who to? Why?)

I thoroughly enjoyed it. I would recommend it for Key Stage 4 students and my rating would be 4 stars.



Pastoral Notice

Our school is one where students are known, supported and nurtured. We believe that outstanding pastoral care is one of the fundamental cornerstones to ensuring students feel safe and happy throughout their secondary education. Every member of staff has a role to play in pastoral care and we have a clear pastoral structure to ensure each student is fully supported during their time at St Andrew the Apostle School.

Students see their form tutors daily. The pastoral system plays a central role in academic success and personal development. The school's approach is closely linked to our academic monitoring systems. The person who links our pastoral support to academic success is the Head of Year.

Form Tutors support students in a variety of ways. They are the first port of call for any issues or concerns your or your child may have in school. If there is any information your child needs from other teachers they cannot immediately see or if they have bullying or friendships concerns, their Form Tutor is the first person they should speak to. Our Heads of Year are a secondary source of support and coordinate the work of the tutor groups and the support that students are offered. Our Heads of Year take responsibility for the welfare and academic outcomes of the students in their year groups.

Reminder COVID safety

Students should be testing themselves at home twice weekly (Wednesdays and Sundays) using lateral flow tests and results should be reported to the school using our online reporting system.

- Students experiencing any symptoms of COVID must not come into school and must go immediately for a PCR test.
- Enhanced cleaning regimes remain in place around the site.
- Students are sanitising their hands on entry to every classroom and wiping down desks at the end of each lesson with sanitiser spray.
- A one-way system remains in place around the school site.
- Students are sat 'side by side' in lessons.
- Teachers are reminded regularly of the need for good ventilation. We have good mechanical ventilation systems in school and windows are routinely kept open.

Currently teaching staff are teaching from 'exclusion zones' at the front of classrooms and are not generally circulating around rooms. We will review this control measure as the autumn term progresses and local and national COVID data is reviewed.
