End of Term Update

Please note that school will finish at 12.30pm today, Thursday 16 December. Students in receipt of free school meals will receive their lunch before dismissal from school.

Term begins again for students at the normal time on Wednesday 5 January 2022* as there is a teacher training day for staff on Tuesday 4 January.

Those families who have requested on-site LFD testing will be contacted with details of the testing arrangements by early next week. *Testing for pre-booked students will take place in Building 5 on Tuesday 4 January 2022.

COVID update



Our COVID-safe protocol has proven to be very effective in keeping our school community safe and well and we will continue with these procedures in the new year.

Reminder: Daily testing for contacts of COVID-19

From Tuesday 14 December, all adults who are fully vaccinated and children aged 5 to 18 years and 6 months, identified as a contact of someone with COVID-19 – whether Omicron or not – should take a lateral flow device (LFD) test every day for 7 days instead of self-isolating. Daily testing by close contacts will help to slow the spread of COVID-19.

Once notified by NHS Test and Trace as a close contact, all eligible staff, pupils and students should take an LFD each day for 7 days and report the results through the Online Reporting System and to their setting. If they test negative, they can continue to attend their education setting. Outside of the education setting, they should continue to follow the advice set out in the Sunday 12 December press release. This approach should also be adopted over the winter break and on return in January.

Anyone who tests positive, should self-isolate and order a PCR test to confirm the result. If the PCR is positive, they must self-isolate for 10 days. If the PCR test is negative, they no longer need to self-isolate but should continue to carry out the remainder of the daily tests, and only need to isolate if it is positive.

Students should be testing themselves at home twice weekly (Wednesdays and Sundays) using lateral flow tests and results should be reported to the school using our online reporting system. This should continue throughout the school holiday. In order to facilitate this over the holiday period, each student has been issued with seven LFD tests in form time today.

Over the Christmas holidays, parents can book first vaccinations for their child, if aged 12 or over, through the NHS booking system. Second doses will be available for eligible children by Monday 20 December.





The Feast of the Nativity – Final Thoughts as Another Term



The Feast of the Nativity of our Lord draws our attention to the Great Divine Truth which is "the Word became flesh" (John 1: 14). It means that God took flesh in order to save man and that the relationship of eternal love between God the Creator and man that He created is a relationship which was broken by disobedience but which has now been restored when God became flesh and "dwelled among us" (John 1: 14).

The Christian faith is based on this doctrine, namely that the Lord Jesus Christ is God incarnate, "so that by believing, you may have life in His name" (John 20: 31). With this faith, the Christian believer is sure that the darkness which did not overcome Christ, will not overcome him too (John 1: 5), because the Lord Jesus born in this dark world has become the light of the world (John 8: 12).

This is the unique divine event which St. Paul calls a great mystery saying: "Without any doubt, the mystery of our religion is great: God was revealed in flesh" (1 Timothy 3: 16). The incarnation of Christ brought back hope to the people, as it is proclaimed by the angels: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men!" (Luke 2: 14). Through His birth, hope was renewed on the face of the earth, joy increased, and salvation was born. Indeed, great is this mystery that casts away fear from the hearts of people, drives away doubt from their minds and strengthens them so that they do not feel insecure but are certain that God -Emanuel - is with us (Matthew 1: 23) since the beginning because "He was in the world, and the world was made by Him" (John 1: 10).

Let us thus seize this opportunity and contemplate the mysteries of the nativity, where we will encounter the humility of the Lord Who "emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness." (Philippians 2: 7), abandoning His great glory in order to save us and discern His will to dwell among us as an infant, choosing the simplicity and the poverty of the manger over the luxurious lifestyle associated with Kings. We thus understand that God's ways are different from the ways of man (Isaiah 55: 8), for His ways lead to salvation and holiness.

As many places around the world continue to suffer because of wars, destruction and other disasters as well as a deteriorating economic situation affecting the people's daily lives, we offer prayers to Christ, the King of peace, asking Him to shine His light in the midst of darkness and let His peace reign in all corners of the world. We pray that 2022 will be full of hope and that the Lord may bless all with security, peace, good health, success and prosperity. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

The aim is to persuade more young people to take an interest in STEM subjects and consider future careers in the intelligence services.

London Mayor and MOPAC Youth Survey

MAYOR OF LONDON

OFFICE FOR POLICING AND CRIME

We know that COVID-19 has had a disproportionate impact on London's young people, and we must do all we can to protect their futures. Today, I am asking for your continued support to achieve this key priority. As part of the current Police and Crime Plan, I, as Mayor of London, have committed to keeping children and young people safe by tackling the crimes that cause the most harm to them. You may know that last year I published an Action Plan to improve trust and confidence in the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS) and to address community concerns about the disproportionality in the use of certain police powers affecting Black Londoners.

I am committed to ensuring that the British model of policing by consent allows for the voices of young people to be heard and reflected in the work we do. To help achieve this, the Mayor's Office for Policing and Crime (MOPAC) is launching the new Youth Survey 2021 across London and we are asking for your support with this project.

What are we aiming to do?

The survey aims to gather the views of young people aged 11 to 16 (school year groups 7 to 11) in relation to a wide range of crime and safety issues, including:

- Personal safety
- Crime victimisation
- Perceptions of the police
- Serious youth violence
- Online activity and safeguarding

Survey responses will be used to drive important improvements in the way that the police and other criminal justice agencies work with and deliver services to young people. The survey will give young people the chance to shape policies and campaigns we develop, and to inform local policing priorities and youth engagement strategies.

We ask for your support...

We would be very grateful for your assistance in helping us to hear from as many young Londoners as possible, to enable us to make real differences to the lives of young people. The survey is hosted online and will be open until 21 January 2022. A link to the survey is included below, which can be copied and pasted into a web browser:

The survey should take around 20 minutes to complete. Participation is entirely voluntary. Please ensure that your school's local policies for consent are followed before taking part. All responses will be anonymous, confidential and will not be attributable to any individual or school.

Throughout the survey, there are links to relevant support agencies as a safeguarding measure for any young people that have concerns around the topics raised.

The previous wave of this survey was conducted in 2018 and received nearly 8,000 responses from young people in London. Results from this survey can be found at: https://www.london.gov.uk/sites/default/files/youth voice survey_report_2018_final.pdf. The results from the 2018 survey were used extensively by MOPAC, the MPS and other agencies. This included helping to assess the effectiveness of the London Needs You Alive campaign, part of a strategy to reduce serious youth violence in the capital.


