Key Messages

At the end of this week and prior to the State Funeral on Monday 19 September 2022, our thoughts clearly remain with the Royal Family following the sad passing of our longest reigning monarch, the late Queen Elizabeth II. The loss will affect many people in different ways, with the vast majority of people never having known anything other than Queen Elizabeth II as monarch and Head of State. I am particularly aware that children and young people who may have experienced bereavement in their families could also be impacted and so am providing a link to the Child Bereavement UK website as a source of information.

I emailed earlier this week to inform you that Monday 19 September 2022 will be a Bank Holiday and schools will be closed as a mark of respect.



We will be marking the life of Queen Elizabeth II as a school and details will follow on this.

Despite is being a sombre period of national mourning, we have found joy in our first full week of school. New Year 7 students and staff are settling into the rhythms of our school and a feature of the school year has been the focus of the students, and this has been most keenly seen in our exam years.

It was also wonderful to give the opportunity to prospective students and parents to experience our distinctive faith ethos during our Open Evening on Thursday 15 September 2022. It was a great evening, where the student helpers, speakers and performers stole the show, performing various duties such as supporting departments and ushering families around our site. Chrystalla and Thea from our Year 13 leadership team spoke eloquently about their 7 years at St Andrew the Apostle and Chrysanthos and Amalia from Year 8 gave an account of their first year in the school. Our two Year 7 speakers, Tia and Andrew, were quite remarkable,

talking about transition and first impressions only having been with us for 7 days; their confidence was amazing! There will be opportunities for those who are hoping to join us in September 2023 to visit the school during our Open Mornings, which start on 20 September 2022. I would like to thank our staff teams for putting on this event, with some departments transferring buildings, and the site and admin teams pulling together all that needed to be done.

Extra-curricular and enrichment starts in earnest next week with football fixtures, a media trip and Year 11 intervention.

CHRISTIAN ORTHODOX FAMILIES AND THE ICON CORNER

One of the distinguishing characteristics of an Orthodox home is its icon corner. The icon corner becomes the spiritual heart of the home—a constant reminder to pray, an intersection between the family and the greater family of saints who have gone before, a sanctuary or rest and renewal in the midst of the world.

Traditionally, an icon corner should be on an eastern facing wall. In an Orthodox Church, Christians pray facing the East for several reasons:

It reminds us of our ancient home in the paradise of Eden. We remember the perfect communion that our first parents Adam and Eve experienced with God while in the Garden, which is described in the Bible as being in the East. We recognize Christ as the Sun of Righteousness, as the light who illumines all men. We face the direction of the rising sun in homage to the eternal Light.

Early Christians interpreted Matthew 24:27 (that the coming of the Son would be like lightning that comes from the East) to mean that the triumphant return of Christ would come from the East. We anticipate this return by facing the East when we pray. However, some houses simply do not have an eastern facing wall available. In that case, it is perfectly fine to locate the icon corner elsewhere.



Here at St Andrew the Apostle, we have established icon stands in all of our classrooms.

Dropping off and picking up students from St Andrew the Apostle School

From Tuesday 20 September 2022 as preparation works for our new school building becomes more advanced, the Brunswick Park Road entrance to the school will not be accessible for vehicles or pedestrians; the only access to school will be through the Oakleigh Road entrance. This is to allow the developers of North London Business Park to complete the necessary highways, access and utilities works ready for our own contractor to start work on the school building itself.

This is a significant change and may add to journey times.

Students who walk to school will have to walk around to the Oakleigh Road entrance. Similarly, those who normally get local buses to Brunswick Park Road should get off the bus at the closest stop to Brunswick Crescent or Brunswick Avenue, where they will walk around to the Oakleigh Road entrance.

If you wish to drop your child off at school, please access the North London Business Park via Oakleigh Road, where you will be directed around the multi-storey car park; drop off will take place in the bays in front of the multi-storey car park. Please see overleaf for a map of our site, which indicates the drop off route for cars in green. Space is limited and there will be congestion, please do not arrive ahead of 3.00pm as any waiting before this time may be deemed as parking and has the potential to be enforced by the owners of the Business Park.

Again, I recognise that this may add additional time to your/your child's journey time. Please adjust your travel time accordingly such that your child can arrive at school in time.

To reduce your travel time and to lessen traffic to make the roads near our school safer (and with a view on working towards goals in the travel plan for our new school building), please look at alternatives to dropping off your children on the school site, which is served well by a number of different bus routes. You may also wish to use 'ride and stride', dropping off your child a couple of roads away from site such that they can walk the remainder of the way to school.

This is a key date in our school year and a wonderful opportunity to celebrate with our students the excellent start that they have made within the St Andrew the Apostle community.

Getting to Hendon Campus, Middlesex University



Accessibility

Hendon Central Underground Station and Middlesex University Hendon Campus are both fully accessible. We advise that you arrive via the main entrance. Steps, pathways and building entrances are displayed on the campus map. Alternative routes and entrances are clearly signposted on site.

By rail

From Hendon rail station – catch the 183 bus from Station Road directly to the main entrance.

By bus

Buses 143, 183 and 326 provide a direct service from the main entrance to Archway, Golders Green and Barnet. These services also provide links to Brent Cross Shopping Centre, Hendon Central Underground and Hendon rail stations.

By underground

Hendon Central station (Northern Line, Edgware branch) is only 30 minutes away from Central London. The walk from the station to Hendon Campus takes approximately 10 minutes. Turn right out of the station, walk up the road to the main junction and then turn right into The Burroughs. As you approach the campus, the Hendon Town Hall and Library are located on the left. Cross the road here and continue past the fire station and you will shortly arrive at the main entrance.

From the North: Leave the M1 at Junction 2 for the A1 south. Turn right at the 2nd set of traffic lights onto the A504 (Finchley Lane). Continue through the next set of traffic lights.

From the A406 (North Circular): Westbound: Take the A1 at Henlys Corner. Turn left at the 1st set of traffic lights onto the A504 (Finchley Lane). Continue through the next set of traffic lights. Eastbound: Take the A41 (Hendon Way) north at the Brent Cross Interchange. Turn right at the 2nd set of traffic lights. Parking is provided for staff and pre-arranged visitors only.

Flu vaccination campaign for years 7, 8 and 9



The NHS has written to schools to update them on changes to the national flu vaccination programme. Please see the contents of their letter below:

We have recently been informed that the flu programme will now include the school years 7, 8 and 9 from September this year.

Early information from the flu season in Australia, shows flu has been circulating earlier than expected and has been affecting younger age groups, therefore DHSC has taken steps to include these age groups in the 2022/23 vaccination campaign. Sessions for flu vaccination have already been planned and confirmed for primary schools so providers will be working with you to arrange additional dates to ensure vaccination can be offered to your students. It is likely that this will be from November onward once additional vaccine supply is available.

We would be very grateful if you could remind parents that their children are entitled to free flu vaccination on the NHS. This vaccine will be provided by a school aged vaccination team that visits the school and is given as a nasal spray. This form of the vaccine is very easy to administer and is especially well suited to preventing onward spread of infection. The vaccine protects the child against the four main strains of influenza predicted to be in circulation this winter. Young children catch influenza very easily. Children can spread the infection for up to 7 days, which is longer than in adults, therefore vaccinating children reduces the risk of influenza for family members, teaching staff and other children. In school, children will be mixing with large numbers of other children in a confined environment, which increases the risk of germs (virus and bacteria alike) spreading. Vaccination builds children's immunity to protect against illnesses. Vaccines stop influenza germs being spread, thus protecting the very vulnerable children and those in the wider community who may not have, or may not be able to develop, immunity.

An ONLINE evening with author Tanya Landman



The Gresham Competition: an oracy competition for Year 12 - entries by 15 November

Gresham College is launching a competition for Year 12 students in September 2022, to promote the art of communicating complex information in a clear, concise <u>and</u> compelling way. This year's theme is the environment and sustainability.

The Competition will:

- support the development of oracy skills.
- help students with UCAS applications and job interviews.
- promote a deeper understanding of the environment.
- introduce students to the inspiring research of world-class academics.
- be an opportunity to present in front of academics and professionals.

How to Enter

Choose one of the following topics and please make a reasoned argument:

- 1. Who should be responsible for creating a better future environment for the next generation? How and why?
- 2. What should the UK government do about the environment that will benefit your generation?
- 3. Who should be most responsible for getting to Net Zero and why?
- 4. What's the greatest positive environmental change you expect to see in your lifetime?
- 5. What responsibilities should young people take on to address environmental/climate issues today and why?

Students will submit a five-minute, recorded presentation – the main focus should be the student speaking but can use images, graphs, or other visual props that help explain your points. Shortlisted candidates will then be invited to present again in person in London, and there will be three awards (including prizes for student and the school).

Guidance and resources will also be provided to help students explain complex issues in a clear, concise, logical and engaging way.

Why Enter?

Benefits for Students:

1. Participating in the Gresham Competition will help students develop oracy and presentation skills useful for interviews and public speaking

- opportunities; it will also enhance CVs and UCAS applications.
- 2. The entry process is quick and easy, with entries filmed and submitted within 5 minutes. We are not judging the video quality – any camera phone will do.
- 3. Finalists will meet a panel of prestigious judges including Professor Myles Allen, the physicist behind Net Zero, and climate change expert Dr lessica Omukuti.
- 4. Winners will receive cash prizes and medals: £250 gold, £200 silver and £150 bronze.
- 5. Since 2022 is a pilot year we expect fewer entries.

Benefits for Schools:

The schools of winners will also benefit with priority access to lectures, visits from Professors or senior leaders, and a certificate.

Each finalist will have five minutes to present and five minutes for Q&A with the panel.
