Key Message from Executive Headteacher

The cyclical nature of school years is wonderful, with peaks and valleys through the year and many events included in our school calendar; the background planning for events in our school calendar is immense, with staff members carefully coordinating. We are very much looking forward to the events in our last few weeks of this autumn term, which for a Christian school is such an important time. We will be visiting St Katherine's Church with each year group for Christmas church services. We will also celebrate the festive season with a Christmas Dinner, which will run alongside Christmas Jumper Day. Friday 9 December 2022 is our Christmas Show and this is always a wonderful event.

On the 8 December, all students will be involved in an Enrichment Day in school when normal lessons are suspended. The focus for this day will be careers and students will focus on different aspects of careers that are relevant to their year group.

Connected to that and on that day will be our Sixth Form Open Event where we will be working with Year 11 students to make choices for the next stage of their education at St Andrew the Apostle School. As Year 11 are thinking about the end of their mock 1 exam, Year 13 are preparing for theirs. Year 11 will go into French and Greek Speaking exams next week and our artists will have their art mock exam.

We also had some great sporing successes this week with a Year 10 win in a cup fixture for the boys and one of our Year 11 students being selected to represent Arsenal Ladies Under 21s.

Please remember that next Friday 2 December 2022 is an INSET and school will be closed for staff training. Part of this day will be dedicated to moderation and analysing the Year 11 and Year 13 mock exam papers as we want to give really honed feedback to students about what they have done well and what steps they need to take to improve. 

St Andrew the First-Called Apostle

This week, we prepare to celebrate the feast day of our school's patron saint, Saint Andrew, the First Called and Apostle on Tuesday 30 November. Few saints are as



prominent in the Eastern Orthodox tradition as St. Andrew the Apostle. Various early testimonies recount his missionary travels throughout Eastern Europe in what is now Greece, the Black Sea regions of Asia Minor (now Turkey), Romania, Ukraine, and Russia. St. Andrew is dear to the hearts and minds of many Orthodox Christians worldwide.

Before he became the patron saint of some of the most prominent Orthodox nations who was he? He appears in all four Gospels as one of the Twelve Disciples of the Lord Jesus. The Gospel of St. John informs us that he was the first of the Lord's disciples, hence St. Andrew's title in Greek, "Protokletos" (First-Called). He is not as prominent a personality in the Gospels as some of the others, particularly his more assertive brother Simon-Peter. But St Andrew is always there, just below the surface. By observing the few times, he rises to the surface of the Gospels, we can discern something about his personality, his close relationship with his Master/teacher Jesus, and his role as a guide and intercessor for the Holy Church today.

The most important thing to note about St Andrew is that the few times he does appear in the Gospels, he is always leading others to Jesus Christ. St Andrew is not outspoken, and he does not come across as one who craves the spotlight, but his gentle, caring personality comes forth and invites others to "come and see" the Master.

First, we meet St Andrew as a spiritual seeker in the first chapter of St John's Gospel (1:35-42). Originally a disciple of St John the Baptist, Andrew is there when John prophesies of the Lord Jesus, "Behold, the Lamb of God!" (John 1:36). Andrew and another disciple leave their first master to go and follow Someone far more important! Jesus invites Andrew and his friend to "come

and see" (1:39), and the two of them spend the rest of the day with this mysterious new Master, learning from Him and observing His manner of life.

After spending the day with this Rabbi (teacher) Jesus, the first thing Andrew does is go and tell his brother Peter: "We have found the Messiah!" The Gospel simply tells us, "And he brought him to Jesus" (1:42). Andrew was on his own humble quest for the truth, and when the Truth came before him, Andrew recognized Him and never looked back.

The second time we meet St Andrew in the Gospels is at the Feeding of the 5,000 by the Sea of Galilee (John 6:4-14). "A great multitude" is now following Jesus, and they are starting to get hungry. The Lord tests one of his other apostles, Philip: "Where shall we buy bread, that these may eat?" (6:5). Philip has no faith, and no ideas. "Two hundred denarii worth of bread is not sufficient for them, that every one of them may have a little!" But Andrew is the one who responds by saying: "There is a lad here who has five barley loaves and two small fish, but what are they among so many?" (6:9). Andrew appears a little short on faith, but he has an inkling that Jesus can provide sustenance for this great multitude of people. Jesus takes the fish and loaves from the little boy, and we all know the rest of the story. It says a great deal about Andrew's character that he would have taken the time to get to know this young boy and introduce him to Jesus at the right time.

Third, and also in the Gospel of John, we again encounter the **Protokletos** leading others to Jesus, this time a group of Greeks who were in Jerusalem to worship the one true God of the Jews on the feast of Passover (12:20-22). The Gospel simply says, "there were certain Greeks among those who came up to worship at the feast. Andrew brings them to Jesus: "Philip came and told Andrew, and in turn Andrew and Philip told Jesus" (12:22). Even among the Apostles, it was apparently recognized that Andrew had a special connection with the Master, and that he was particularly gifted in leading others to Him. Even apart from Andrew's later missionary travels, it's no wonder Greek Christians to this day venerate St. Andrew as their patron saint, the one who leads prayers on their behalf before the Holy Trinity. In each of these examples, St. Andrew is not trying to do anything exceptional. He comes across to us as simple, faithful, humble, kind, and friendly, with an openness toward others.

After Pentecost/the resurrection, St. Andrew's missionary travels would take him through modern day

Greece, Romania, Ukraine, and Russia. He was finally nailed to an X-shaped cross in the Greek city of Patras, where he gave his life as a martyr for the sake of His Master. One version of St Andrew's martyrdom puts these beautiful words to the Holy Cross on his lips: "O good Cross, made beautiful by the body of my Lord! So long desired, so anxiously loved, so unceasingly sought after, and now at last ready for my soul to enjoy! Take me from amidst men, and restore me to my Master, that by thee he may receive me, who by thee redeemed me."

Saint Andrew's relics rested in Patras until the midfourth century, when the emperor moved them to the Church of the Holy Apostles in Constantinople. During the sack of Constantinople in the thirteenth century, the Crusaders took the bones and cross of St. Andrew back to Italy. In 1964, as a gesture of good will, Pope Paul VI presented St Andrew's skull back to the Greek Orthodox Church, and then in 1980, the X-shaped cross.

Since thou wast first called among the Apostles, and a brother of the head, implore, O Andrew, the Master of all to grant the inhabited world safety and our souls the great mercy. Amen.


Dr Frost

In the maths department we are so pleased and so proud of our students. We have achieved an important milestone in reaching a **million points** using Dr Frost Maths platform for homework and independent study in maths. This is because of the great effort and teamwork our students and teachers have shown.

This is testament to our student's commitment and enthusiasm to excel in maths. As a school we are very proud of our students' achievements. On average our students are completing 20,000 questions on Dr Frost weekly. This has placed us firmly in the top 20% of schools nationally.

Dr Frost Maths platform is not only an excellent homework platform but is also used extensively to fill in gaps in learning identified from assessments and lessons. One of the most useful functions in Dr Frost Maths website, is the ability for our maths curriculum to be directly accessed term by term through the courses section. Many of our students have commented that this functionality has been extremely useful in developing their independent study skills to revise and practice maths regularly.

If students are absent from school or need to revise of the next term's test, we strongly advise this is the best



way for students to access support.

Period Poverty Information

'Period poverty' refers to having a lack of access to sanitary products due to financial constraints. Having access to sanitary products is something that many of us probably take for granted. Period poverty is a very real challenge facing many girls in the UK and around the world. For too many girls, dealing with their period each month is proving a tough challenge reality—and in 21st century Britain, this should not be the case.

'Period stigma' is a broad term for discrimination faced by people that menstruate, from physical problems such as lack of access to sanitation supplies to the verbal shaming of menstruating people as "dirty" or "unclean". Period stigma results in a lower quality of life for those who are faced with it. Stigma is defined as the shame and disgrace society attaches unfairly to something associated with a particular circumstance, quality, or person. Period stigma creates a sense of shame, embarrassment, or hesitation to talk about periods.

In Barnet, we want to support every young person to have access to sanitary products regardless of financial constraints. Also, we want to challenge 'period stigma' and encourage young people to feel comfortable being on their period and all young people regardless of their gender, to have a healthy perception of periods and be able to talk about periods without a sense of embarrassment or shame. We have developed a questionnaire to gain insight into the views and experiences of young people about period poverty and stigma. Attendance



School attendance: what parents need to know Why is good attendance important?

Good attendance and punctuality are vital for success at school, and to establish positive life habits that are necessary for future success.

Through regular attendance, pupils can:

Build friendships and develop social groups.

Develop life skills.

Engage in essential learning and other school social events.

Achieve to their full potential.

Minimise the risk of engaging in anti-social behaviour and becoming victims or perpetrators of crime.

All parents should promote good attendance and work in partnership with their child's school to provide a cohesive approach.

What does the law say?



All children of compulsory school age – between 5-16 – must receive a suitable full-time education. As a parent, you are responsible for ensuring that this happens,

either by registering your child at a school or by making appropriate alternative arrangements.

Legal action can involve a penalty notice or being taken to court

Parents also face the risk of imprisonment and parenting orders. Parenting orders involve attending a counselling and guidance programme, usually a parenting class.

A penalty notice of £60 per adult per child may be issued as an alternative to prosecution, but this will rise to £120 if it is not paid within 21 days. Failure to pay a penalty notice will usually lead to prosecution.



Can my child ever be absent?

When a pupil is absent from school, this will be classified as either 'authorised' or 'unauthorised'.

The governing board and headteacher decide which absences are granted as authorised.

Authorised absences are only permitted for valid reasons, e.g.:

- Illness
- Medical or dental appointments
- Religious observances
- Family bereavement

Wherever possible, parents should always try to arrange medical and dental appointments during school holidays or after school hours.

Holidays during term time

- The school cannot authorise an absence for a holiday during term time.
- Taking holidays during term time means that pupils miss important school time – both educationally and for other school activities. It will be difficult for pupils to catch up on work when they return to school. Only in exceptional circumstances may a holiday be authorised during term time – this will be decided by the headteacher.
- Exceptional circumstances do not involve cheaper costs, family availability or weather conditions.
- You will be fined if you take your child on holiday during term time without permission from the headteacher.

Requesting absences



All absences, including for holidays, must be requested as far in advance as possible – the minimum notice period is **20 days**. If you think your child needs

to be taken out of school, you should discuss the reasons with the headteacher as soon as possible.

If the headteacher is satisfied with the evidence and the notice period, they will authorise the absence.

The headteacher will decide the amount of time a pupil can be away from school, taking into account their attendance record.

Requests **will not** be granted in the following circumstances:

- Immediately before or during assessment periods
- When a pupil's attendance record shows any unauthorised absence for any reason
- Where a pupil's authorised absence record is already above 10 percent, for any reason

Lateness and truancy

Class registers will be taken at **8.30am** Children arriving between **8.30am** and **8.55am** will be marked late. Children arriving after **8.55am** will be marked **U** This is an unauthorized absence.



Attendance matters!

Don't underestimate the **importance of 100 percent** attendance. Even one day missed can have an effect on learning:

- 98 percent attendance means four school days missed
- 95 percent attendance means 10 school days missed
- 90 percent attendance means 19 school days missed
- 80 percent attendance means 38 school days missed
- Five minutes late each day means three school days missed

Our Code of Conduct

This is the Code of Conduct always defining the minimum expectations of students. All expectations come under three broad headings. They are supported by Character education and our values, *Respect, Responsibility, Caring, Fairness, Forgiveness, Honesty and Trustworthiness.*

RESPECTFUL

- Do as you are asked by all members of staff, first time without question.
- Listen to others, do not call out, and use appropriate language and tone.
- Be kind to each other and take care of the building, displays and equipment.

RESPONSIBLE

- Follow rules for health and safety, including walking on the left.
- Keep hands, feet, objects and personal comments to yourself.
- Be in the right place at the right time, and not unsupervised areas.
- Leave valuables at home; the school is not responsible for them.

READY

- Be punctual.
- Be in full school uniform, worn properly.
- Be silent when entering a classroom.
- All necessary equipment out on desk, and everything else away.
- Bags on the floor, coats on the chair.
- All headphones, phones and other electronic equipment off and out of sight – otherwise will be confiscated.
- No gum or food, or fluid other than water.

Safeguarding



TikTok has now raised its Livestreaming Age Requirement to 18 (BBC News)

TikTok has frequently been called out for its glaring failures to protect

under 18s which use its service. With its flashy images, easily digestible content and 'childlike' feel it has always been popular among school aged children. A fact which has made its safeguarding failures all the more worrying. The platform's attempt to ban under 18s seems to be unfeasible however, and so it is as important as ever to be aware of its usage in the classroom. In particular, its gift function can easily be manipulated in order to commit criminal acts against children. As such wariness around the app should not be lowered as a result. Many students use WhatsApp despite there being a minimum age rating of 16. There are some inherent dangers to students using this including:

- Bullying, particularly in group chats
- Seeing content of a sexual nature, or showing violence and hatred
- Settings that allow messages to disappear after 24 hours or 7 days. This could make it harder to track bullying, and your child might share things they wouldn't otherwise because it'll disappear
- Sharing their live location, particularly with people they don't know in person
- Spam or hoax messages
- Being exposed to strangers through group chats

Keep your child safe on WhatsApp

What are the risks?

- Bullying, particularly in group chats
- Seeing content of a sexual nature, or showing violence and hatred
- Settings that allow messages to disappear after 24 hours or 7 days. This could make it harder to track bullying, and your child might share things they wouldn't otherwise because it'll disappear
- Sharing their live location, particularly with people they don't know in person

- Being exposed to strangers through group chats WhatsApp says the **minimum age** to use it is **16**, but younger children can still use it easily.

6 steps to help your child use WhatsApp safely1. Keep their personal information and location private

By default, WhatsApp shows profile photos, status and when you last used it to all users.

Encourage your child to only share this information with their contacts and be careful about who they talk to on the app, as anyone could pretend to be a child online.

To check and change these settings:

- On an iPhone, open settings in WhatsApp (the cogicon), then Account > Privacy. Tap the setting you want to change, then choose who it should be visible to
- On Android, tap the 3 dots in the top-right of the home screen, then > Settings > Account > Privacy.
 Tap the setting you want to change, then choose who it should be visible to

WhatsApp also has a feature that you can use to share your 'live location' with others. Tell your child to keep this turned off, or to only share their location with people they trust.

To check this:

- On an iPhone, go to phone Settings (the cog icon)
 WhatsApp > Location, and tap to change if you need to
- On Android, go to privacy settings as above, then scroll down to 'Live location', and tap to change if you need to

2. Remind your child to be careful about what they share

It's easy to forward messages, photos and videos to others on WhatsApp. Even if your child sets a

message to automatically disappear or deletes it after sharing it, the person they send it to could still screenshot it, forward it to someone else, or save it.

So before they share anything, tell them to ask themselves: "Would I want others to see what I'm about to send?"

3. Remind your child they can leave group chats

If they see something they're not comfortable with in a group chat or are in a chat with someone they don't know and are uncomfortable with, they should leave the group. To do this:

- On an iPhone, go into the group chat, tap the group subject, then > Exit group > Exit group
- On Android, go into the group chat, tap the group subject, then > Exit group > Exit

4. Make sure your child knows how to report and block people

When they first receive a message from an unknown number, they'll have the option to report it.

If someone in your child's contacts is upsetting them or making them uncomfortable, they can report or block them at any point (WhatsApp won't tell the user they've been blocked/reported).

To do this:

- On an iPhone, open settings in WhatsApp, go to Account > Privacy > Blocked > Add New..., then find the contact they want to block, and tap the contact
- On Android, tap the 3 dots icon, then Settings, then tap Account > Privacy > Blocked contacts, tap the icon in the top right showing a person and a plus sign, search for the contact they want to block, then tap the contact to block them

To report issues like offensive or abusive content or spam:

- On an iPhone, open the chat with the user you want to report, tap the contact then then tap Report Contact > Report And Block
- On Android, open the chat with the user you want to report, then tap the 3 dots icon, then > More > Report

5. Encourage your child to watch out for spam and hoax messages

These can appear to come from contacts, as well as people they don't know. Tell your child to watch out for messages that:

 Ask them to tap on a link, or specifically to click on a link to activate a new feature

- Ask them to share personal information like bank account details, date of birth or passwords
- Ask them to forward the message
- Say they have to pay to use WhatsApp
- Have spelling or grammar errors

6. Tell our school about any bullying they experience

Look for signs they your child may be being bullied, like being afraid or reluctant to go to school, feeling nervous, losing confidence or becoming distressed and withdrawn, or losing sleep.

Flu vaccination campaign for years 7, 8 and 9



The NHS has written to schools to update them on changes to the national flu vaccination programme. Please see the contents of their letter below:

We have recently been informed that the flu programme will now include the school years 7, 8 and 9 from September this year.

Early information from the flu season in Australia, shows flu has been circulating earlier than expected and has been affecting younger age groups, therefore DHSC has taken steps to include these age groups in the 2022/23 vaccination campaign. Sessions for flu vaccination have already been planned and confirmed for primary schools so providers will be working with you to arrange additional dates to ensure vaccination can be offered to your students. It is likely that this will be from November onward once additional vaccine supply is available.

We would be very grateful if you could remind parents that their children are entitled to free flu vaccination on the NHS. This vaccine will be provided by a school aged vaccination team that visits the school and is given as a nasal spray. This form of the vaccine is very easy to administer and is especially well suited to preventing onward spread of infection.

The vaccine protects the child against the four main strains of influenza predicted to be in circulation this winter. Young children catch influenza very easily.

Children can spread the infection for up to 7 days, which is longer than in adults, therefore vaccinating children reduces the risk of influenza for family members, teaching staff and other children.

In school, children will be mixing with large numbers of other children in a confined environment, which increases the risk of germs (virus and bacteria alike) spreading. Vaccination builds children's immunity to protect against illnesses.

Vaccines stop influenza germs being spread, thus protecting the very vulnerable children and those in the wider community who may not have, or may not be able to develop, immunity.
